Knights in Action – Petition against Correns’ agreement

Background:



For over a year now you have heard me report on the Corren's and the manner in which they manipulated the Provincial Government into changing the school curriculum to include alternate lifestyles as an acceptable way of living. This material is to be taught in all grade levels. Furthermore, students are being told not to discuss the issue with their parents. Thus, the government has introduced a policy of making it acceptable for students to keep secrets from their parents and removing the basic rights of parents from being the ultimate decision makers as to what their children can and cannot be taught.

This issue is so important, the Supreme Council has allowed the BC and Yukon State Jurisdiction to ally itself with "Parents for Democracy in Education". The State Council encouraged the local council getting signature on petition.

Action:

St. Francis Xavier Council 10500 supported this to protect what your children and grandchildren to be taught in school. With the permission from our pastor, we made announcement and posted the detail onto the parish weekly announcement. The petition stated that the undersigned petitioners respectfully request that the Honourable House enact legislation to reassert that parents have the prime responsibility for the education of their children and to allow all citizens to have rights to review changes



affecting what is taught in the schools, with no special rights to private citizens such as those conceded to in the Settlement Agreement with the Correns signed in April of 2006. We successfully collected 205 signatures on June 28 after each Sunday Mass in the morning. The petitions were sent to the Honourable the Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia.
